accepted, and receipts must now be turned in within 2 years of the purchase date.



Hang On to Your Hats While the Michigan Legislature is in Session

So many worthwhile bills which waited decades for hearings and passage are now getting consideration. HB 4001 increased the Earned Income Tax Credit to 30%, an increase of 24%, was signed into law by Governor Whitmer. SB4 expanding Elliott Larsen Civil Rights to include LGBTQ individuals passed. This bill ensures Michiganders cannot be fired or evicted from their home because of gender identity, sexual orientation, or gender expression. Let's not forget the repeal of the 1931 law banning abortion.

The Michigan Legislature passed firearm laws calling for universal background checks for all gun purchases, safe storage and extreme risk protection allowing removal of weapons from an individual who is at risk for injuring themselves or others.

AAUW's Mary Pollock provided support for passage of HB 4127 protecting election workers on election day by prohibiting firearms in a polling place. HB 4128 prohibits firearms within 100 feet of absentee ballot counting board while ballots are being counted.

Senate Bills 209, 210 211 and 212 have been introduced to raise the minimum age to marry to 18. Michigan is being held up as a beacon of hope for civil rights and reproductive freedom.

In the face of what is happening in the rest of the country we can pray the Michigan legislature continues to use this window of opportunity to effect meaningful change on behalf of Michigan residents. You can see the legislature respecting the will of the people, reflecting the ballot proposals passed and the polls which evidence the support for safe storage, universal background checks and even extreme risk order bills.

This picture is in sharp contrast to what is happening in the rest of the country. The Paycheck Fairness Bill might have a chance. Please call Senator Stabenow, and Senator Peters and Representative Bergman. The gender pay gap exists in every profession in every age group and widens as women age. It follows women with lower retirement savings and pension benefits. This disparity leaves women without a cushion to weather economic or health crisis. The Paycheck Fairness Act closes loopholes in the 1963 Equal Pay Act. It gives women the tools to challenge pay discrimination and provides incentives for employers to comply. Even though our Senators have a history of co-sponsoring this legislation, they need to hear from us that this bill has widespread support. It is urgent that this bill be passed so that women are fairly and equitably compensated for their work.

With the makeup of the present U. S. House of Representatives, it is unlikely the ERA will pass.

Reproductive freedom nationally is at such risk. Take heart! We live in Michigan!

Comments from Carol...

Meg Goodrich and I attended a zoom meeting for MI branch presidents last week. Here are some highlights:

- 1) WE NEED 2 DELEGATES to join me, (I am filling in for President of the Marquette Branch) to attend the state annual meeting, Saturday, April 29, by zoom from 9:30 to noon. IT IS IMPORTANT that we have delegates join me because there will be two main issues voted on, and without 40% of the possible delegates attending, we can't have a valid vote.

 The number of delegates is based on the number of members in a branch, and we have 2 delegate spots plus the president. The issues to be voted on are election of officers and approving amendments to the bylaws. There is a newsletter coming out from the State AAUW offices shortly and you will be made aware of the slate for officers and what bylaws amendments may be.
- 2) During the meeting, there was a discussion of potential bylaws amendments. It is likely that the "due date" for membership years will change from July, as we've done in the past, to a "rolling" date based on when members enroll. Meg, others, and I discussed why we are opposed to this due to its creating difficulties for treasurers. I added my name to a letter being sent to the national office sharing our concerns. There is actually one branch whose treasurer will resign if this passes.
- 3) There will be no more national conventions, and state conventions will be held virtually one year and in person on alternate years. Next year's convention will likely be the last weekend in April, but a place has not been determined. Meanwhile, there will be a first-ever REGIONAL convention held in St. Louis on Oct. 19-21, including 11 states which represent 38% of the total national membership. Members in Wisconsin are going to charter a bus. Please consider going to represent our chapter!
