LMC

LMC surveyed students right after being closed for Covid to check with them about which needs the school could help with. Students were asked to rank a variety of areas from most important to least. These included food, transportation, child care, financial literacy, college book financing, tutoring, and a variety of other needs. After seeing the survey results, the Student Financial Stability Committee chose food insecurity as an area to target. They spent time visiting and learning from colleges and universities who already have established student pantries. LMC is partnering with Feeding America to develop a large food pantry at the Benton Harbor campus. This proposal includes an online ordering system that students from Niles and South Haven can use to receive access to refrigerated or perishable goods. The committee also proposed several smaller snack stations like the one at South Haven campus (that is sponsored by AAUW). (Thank you, **Peggy Murnighan**). The Niles and Benton Harbor versions are on track to be open in the next month.

Women in History



HENRIETTA SWAN LEAVITT At about 30 years of age.

Henrietta Swan Leavitt was an American astronomer. A graduate of Radcliffe College, she worked at the Harvard College Observatory as a "computer", tasked with examining photographic plates in order to measure and catalog the brightness of stars. This work led her to discover the relation between the luminosity and the period of Cepheid variables. Leavitt's discovery provided astronomers with the first "standard candle" with which to measure the distance to faraway galaxies.

Before Leavitt discovered the period-luminosity relationship for Cepheid variables, the only techniques available to astronomers for measuring the distance to a star were based on parallax and triangulation. Such techniques can only be used for measuring distances up to hundreds of light years. Leavitt's work allowed astronomers to measure distances up to about 20 million light years. As a result of this, it is now known that our own galaxy, the Milky Way, has a diameter of about 100,000 light years. After Leavitt's death, Edwin Hubble used Leavitt's period-luminosity relation, to establish that the universe is expanding. Hubble often said that Leavitt deserved the Nobel Prize for her work. Leavitt was a member of Phi Beta Kappa, the American Association of University Women, the American Astronomical and Astrophysical Society, the American Association for the Advancement of Science, and an honorary member of the American Association of Variable Star Observers.
